As all responsible dog owners know, when exercising your dogs in the village and especially on the playing field


please pick up after them



VANDALISM IN SPOONER ROW

A PERSONAL VIEW FROM THE SECRETARY

I moved to Spooner Row in March 1968. After 35 years I think I could be considered if not a local, at least a long term resident. There have been changes; the shop closed; there are more properties; we have pavements; the school has grown since my three daughters attended; The Boars has changed it's name and become a lot smarter. But Spooner Row is still a sleepy place with time to chat to neighbours. There is plenty going on, with the Village Hall the main focus. The biggest change I have seen is the Village Hall. When we first moved here we had an annual flower show and fete. There was stiff competition for the best six carrots arranged on a plate, I remember digging up a whole row to find six that didn't have the tell-tale signs of carrot fly. The hall was busy but tatty. There was never enough money for all the up keep. The out side was sound, but the heating system was noisy and inefficient, the décor was scruffy, the toilets had an aroma all their own, the electrics would have done Noah proud, the floor was rotten in places and so on. There was a very great chance that the Hall would close.

Then we had the chance of lottery money to up date our 'ugly duckling'. A lot of work went into the applications for which Karen Dunn must be thanked. We all worried about what would happen if the applications were turned down. The hall would have to close, we could not possibly afford the necessary work to meet current regulations. Then Hooray, we got the money, organised the contractors (easier said than done) and at last our hall is pukka. And I mean PUKKA! Apart from new windows at the front, we have largely finished the necessary work. We now have a hall fit for future 'Spooner Rowians'. A large hall with character, not a modern box.

It was therefore a huge shock when vandals attacked our hall. The new backdoor had 2 holes put in it and a new double glazed window was also broken. The total cost of repair £223,35! That's £223.35 down the drain, wasted! It is almost all the profit from the last Quiz evening. In thirty five years I cannot remember any damage to the hall. When it was tatty it was safe. Now it is smart it seems to be a target. We are lucky in the village, crime rate is low, vandalism is almost unheard of. And someone has attacked our hall! I speak for all the committee when I say how hurt we felt, how upset that all our efforts on behalf of the village were not valued. Do the vandals want the hall to close? Insurance costs are already high, we still need a substantial amount of money just to run the hall. It is an uphill struggle to keep it open. If more damage is done the future of the Hall will once again come into question.

Without the hall, our community will have no heart. We all need to pull together and look after our hall. I only hope that the one attack is just an isolated incident and we can put it firmly behind us and look to the future.
