

New Play Equipment

Over the next 3–5 years, Wymondham Town Council will be upgrading all the playgrounds in Wymondham, including Spooner Row. About £7,000 to £10,000 will be allocated to each play area to provide equipment, a safety surface and the recommended fencing. The standard pack normally includes such things as teen swings, children's swings, a rocking rooster, a slide and a climbing frame. The existing climbing frame will be removed in the near future. A Walk on the Wild Side

SPRING TONIC HERBS Chickweed is another good

It is at this time of year that previous generations - probably more in tune with the natural world than we are today- would be starting to look out for Spring tonic herbs as antidote to winter lethargy or feeling under the weather after flu or a cold. Most people know that it is good to use nettles as a Spring tonic- they contain a multitude of vitamins and minerals especially iron and calcium. Nettles can be made into soups, can be infused for a tea or they can be cooked like spinach.

There are many other Spring tonic herbs, and these are often very common plants—dandelion leaves (beneficial to the liver and urinary system) can be used in a salad; hawthorn leaves and later the flowers, are the best heart tonic herb, they used to be called 'bread and cheese' and are also good added to a salad, or infused for a tea.

herb in salad, and is helpful as a detoxifier-often used with skin complaints such as eczema. Cleavers or goosegrass is a lymphatic system cleanser and is a bit stringy in salads unless you use only the youngest plants, but makes a good tea. Chicory is a wonderful liver herb- the bitterness is what works on the liver and digestive system—to put in your salad. Plantain leaves contain an antihistamine so are good for allergies, again these can be a bit stringy in salads unless very young, but make a good tea. Dock leaves contain a lot of vitamins and minerals, as plantain, these need to be used young or in

Herb teas or infusions are made by allowing the fresh (or dried) herb to steep in boiling water for 10-15 minutes. You make them to taste, but as a guide you want about 8 nettle tops (top

4-6 leaves) for 2 mugs of nettle tea, this would be the equivalent of 2-3 teaspoonfuls of dried herb.

All of these herbs can be used by anyone on a daily basis (except hawthorn in large quantities if on some heart drugs) as long as you are sure what you are picking. It is also important to only pick from somewhere clean, not from the roadside, or around a sprayed field-your garden is the best place if you have allowed some 'weeds' to grow. If anyone is interested I hold herb walks in the summer in Spooner Row during which I identify all these plants, together with many others and tell you how to use them for yourselves.


Feasibility Study

A Feasibility Study was recently undertaken to establish the most cost-effective option for securing the future of Spooner Row Village Hall. The Study (part funded by Wymondham Town Council and South Norfolk District Council) was in favour of refurbishing the current Village Hall as opposed to building a new one. The project will be tackled in stages as and when funding becomes available. Phase one includes repairing the floor, total rewiring and a new heating system. Phase two includes replacing the windows and phase three includes an extension to the Hall with new toilets, kitchen, etc. This project has been given the support of Wymondham Town Council.


